Historians will discover a trove of archaeological delight, with churches at Althorne, Burnham and Southminster as well as pretty quaint old public houses offering a variety of local ales and fayre.

You will be surprised what you will discover on the Crouch Valley Line.

If you want something more energetic you can try sailing at Burnham-on-Crouch (or if a little more restful is your aim of your day, seal watching). There is also a chance to view a wealth of wildlife at Blue House Farm Mature Reserve at Morth Fambridge, or the award winning Marsh Farm at South Woodham Ferrers where you will find these

Both North Fambridge and Althorne boast delightful riverside walks and wonderful scenes that line the banks of the River Crouch, where this line takes its name from. Should your walk need to be closer to the indoors, there is Battlesbridge, where you can find the world famous antiques centre and admire the design of the building and the contents within.

There is something for everyone along the Crouch Valley Line, which runs for 16.5 miles from Wickford (on the London to Southend line) to Southminster at the top of the Dengie Peninsula. The line has seen all manner of use over the years and gives you the opportunity to enjoy a journey through the beautiful Essex Countryside.

The Crouch Valley Line

The pier is the longest pleasure pier in the world, stretching 1.34 miles with the option to take the train or have a leisurely stroll.

The Southend line from Shenfield to Southend Victoria is popular with both commuters and tourists. Southend-on-Sea has lots to offer, sitting on the northern side of the Thames Estuary it's a traditional seaside town.

The Southend Line

The Gainsborough Line

The Gainsborough Line marks a delightful rural railway journey running from Marks Tey in Essex to Sudbury in Suffolk.

Leaving Marks Tey junction with the Great Eastern Main Line, the train emerges from leafy cuttings to cross the impressive 32 arch viaduct (the second largest brick built structure in England) above the village of Chappel, and high above the river Colne.

Just after the viaduct is the station for Chappel and Wakes Colne and home to the East Anglian Railway Museum. This thriving little railway runs alongside the branch line and hosts a number of themed events each year – worth a visit, as is a walk under the viaduct.

The next station is Bures which is intersected by the county boundary and the river Stour which runs through this village providing pleasant river walks and an opportunity to have one foot in Essex and one in Suffolk.

Sudbury, the end of the line, is an attractive market town, with many historic buildings including Gainsborough's House Museum, opportunities for shopping and leisure activities.

All stations have eating and drinking facilities nearby and the annual Chappel beer festival attracts thousands from around the region.

The Flitch Line

The Flitch Line runs along the Brain Valley between Witham and Braintree and is the remaining part of the line that ran via Dunmow to Bishops Stortford.

The line from Braintree to Bishop's Stortford closed during the Beeching era of cuts, but the commuter branch line from Witham to Braintree remained.

The line passes through White Notley and Cressing, home of the Cressing Temple, calling at Braintree Freeport Designer Village (for fashionista bargain hunters) and Braintree.

There are country walks and cycle routes (John Ray Walk and Flitch Way the start of which is adjacent to Braintree Station), take in the history at Braintree Museum or you can just relax in the areas many hostelries and restaurants.

Travelling by train is easy and takes just 60 minutes from London.

The train continues to Thorpe-le-Soken where the line splits giving you the choice to go to Walton-on-the-Naze, with its great sandy beach and a pier you can walk along watching sea fishing and crabbing. If you chose to take the train to Clacton-on-Sea, you can visit the pier with its undercover fairground for those rainy days, or a bowling alley and sea front gardens. Look out for events such as the annual air show at www.visitessex.com

Your journey travels through Alresford where you can find the finest country walks in Essex and on to Great Bentley, where the village entices you with pubs which overlook the 43 acre green, recognised as the largest village green in the country. Sunny summer afternoons will find a cricket

Proceeds and streets of the old village comes to an end at the picturesque quayside where fishing and sailing boats bob at their moorings. You can walk alongside the river towards Hythe Quay or the other direction towards Arlesford creek.

At the end of the line is Harwich Town where you will find a seasonal ferry over to Shotley and Felixstowe in Suffolk or if you prefer to remain on dry land, you can enjoy a day out where you can have a leisurely lunch.

Trains go onwards to the next stop of Harwich International, which is a focused interchange for ferries and large cruise ships making their way around the world. There are even occasional non-stop trains to Harwich International from London Liverpool Street. The branch line then takes travellers to the next stop of Dovercourt, a small busy town with a regular Friday Market, and a short walk to the sea front.

The train calls at Wrabness where you can walk past the community shop and join footpaths which run past the house which Grayson Perry designed and is one of the houses for living architecture.

The Mayflower line runs from Manningtree, which is the usual terminus for the branch trains, connecting with services to London and Ipswich. The branch follows the path of the estuary of the River Stour to Harwich. The train stops at Mistley, a small riverside town noted for its large number of swans which gather on the river bank in an area of wolld with the south bank.

TICKETS & FARES – Tickets can be purchased from ticket offices, or ticket machines (where available). If travelling from a station with ticket selling facilities you must purchase your ticket before you board. For certain tickets types it is cheaper to book in advance online.

OFF PEAK TICKETS – Travel after 9.30am on weekdays. Off-Peak Day tickets do not have evening peak restrictions so the return journey can be made at any time, including from London. There are also special tickets available off peak.

SUPER OFF-PEAK DAY TICKETS – When travelling to London or Stratford these tickets are valid on the first train that arrives in London after 12.00 on Mondays to Fridays. The return journey from London may not be made between 16.00 and 19.00 inclusive. On local journeys, Super Off-Peak tickets may be used at any time after 12.00. No return restrictions apply from stations outside London. At weekends Super off-peak tickets may be used at any time of day so are the best value option.

GROUP SAVE TICKETS – Groups of three to nine people all get a third off their tickets when travelling together which is equal to every third person travelling free.

CHILD TICKETS – Children aged 5-15 travel for half price and children under 5 travel free.

RAILCARDS – Various railcards are available where you can get up to a third off the price of off-peak tickets.

16 – 25 Railcard – for anyone aged 16 – 25.

Senior Railcard – for anyone aged 60 and over.

Friends and Family Railcard – for family groups.

Two Together Railcard – now available from all stations and online. This is a saving of 34% when two travel together.

Network Card – Anyone aged 16+ travelling in the South East (minimum fare applies weekdays).






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
